The **SCOOP** on units:

6E Surgical Progressive Care

6E SPCU is a 28-bed progressive care unit serving adult patients.

Patients are seen on this dynamic, fast-paced floor with a wide variety of medical diagnoses, surgical procedures, and trauma injuries. They require surgical, trauma, and cardiopulmonary progressive care.

The SPCU (Surgical Progressive Care Unit) is the only critical care surgical trauma stepdown unit specializing in chest tube management. Staff assists with bedside procedures and sees all types of postsurgical patients, with a specialty in cardiac, vascular, and thoracic.

SPCU nurses are skilled in complex diagnoses and respiratory-compromised situations requiring BiPAP/CPAP, high flow oxygenation, and continuous

pulse oximetry. Staff is trained in epidurals, PCA pumps, and complex IV drips requiring telemetry monitoring.

Transitioning to a single, unified electronic health record platform powered by Epic will lead to more efficient care delivery for our providers and care teams and enable UPMC to continue expanding access to care.

Epic workgroups are nearing the end of the decision/design phase and progressing into content review sessions. Tentative Epic go-live is planned to roll out in two waves. Wave 1 is slated for the end of 2025 with wave 2 planned for the first half of 2026.

Altoona is tentatively scheduled to be part of the initial roll-out period.

Disability documentation in the EHR - CHRIS form

Upon admission, transfer, or handoff, staff must ask patients at their earliest encounter about any disability-related needs or necessary accommodations, and document the response in the electronic health record where applicable on the CHRIS form.

If the patient has a disability, additional fields on the form will open for completion. Be sure to complete "Personal Disability Items with Patient" document needed accommodations on the patient's white board.
